



# Law Enforcement in the United States

## 2. Municipal police

Municipal police operate mainly within city limits. They respond to calls, patrol, enforce local rules and handle first-level incidents. Organization depends on city budget, local leadership and the appointed chief of police.

## 3. Sheriff and county

A county sheriff is often elected and may cover unincorporated areas, manage the county jail, provide court security and serve warrants. Duties vary widely between rural and urban counties.

## 4. State police

State Police, State Patrol or Highway Patrol operate at state level, often on roads, highways, major crashes, support to local agencies and specialized investigations. Names and authority vary by state.

## 5. Federal level

Federal agencies act in matters covered by federal law. FBI, DEA, ATF, U.S. Marshals, CBP, ICE and Secret Service have distinct roles. They do not replace local agencies.

## 6. Governance

The system combines elected and appointed offices. Sheriffs are frequently elected, while municipal chiefs are commonly appointed. Oversight boards exist in some jurisdictions, with varying powers.

## 7. Data and transparency

BJS, FBI Crime Data Explorer and NIBRS are official sources. Data depends on agency participation, definitions and collection year. Cities may also publish local datasets.

## 8. France / United States comparison

France is more centralized through Police nationale and Gendarmerie nationale. The United States is more fragmented, with local, county, state and federal agencies. Status, funding, training and governance differ structurally.

## 9. What French visitors should remember

In an emergency, call 911. Outside emergencies, identify the competent agency by location and matter. A French consulate can assist in serious difficulty, but cannot replace a local attorney.

## 10. Pay

Pay varies by city, county, state, federal level, cost of living, premiums, seniority and benefits. BLS figures are indicative medians and not guarantees.

## 11. Comparative table

Local applications go through each agency website. Federal jobs are published on USAJOBS. Procedures may include physical tests, background investigation, interview, medical exam and academy.

## 13. How to apply

A typical path is to identify the agency, check criteria, apply, complete tests and attend training. Each agency keeps its own rules and deadlines.
